## It's called NJC-GAP...

and it's going to do a world of good—especially in the world of state government support. What is NJC-GAP? It's the **New Jersey Camps Governmental Affairs Project**, and it's time for all camps to get involved—to help bridge the important gap between our camps and Trenton.

About a year ago, ACA-NJ Section Board's Legislative Committee, along with a group of dedicated private camp directors and a professional consultant began working on ways to enable the camp industry in New Jersey to have a bigger presence in the state capitol. We knew this would allow the New Jersey camp industry to be proactive in legislative and regulator issues that might impact children's camps throughout the state. The Board also charged the Legislative Committee with the task of finding a way to fund the work, simply because the Section's budget is not adequate to do the job, and also because many camps who will benefit from this project are not ACA-NJ Section members.

The result of several months of work was the formation of NJC-GAP.

NJC-GAP is a membership organization that will raise money to support the camp industry in New Jersey and will work to forge relationships with government officials, making them aware of our important role in youth development. The organization partners with and receives limited funds from ACA-NJ and NY Sections.

Claudine Leone, our Governmental Affairs Consultant, made a presentation at Tri-State that clearly identified the importance of this effort. In fact, in her first eight months on the job there have been at least six key government-related accomplishments.

As a member of the Legislative Committee, I have had the opportunity to work with Claudine. I sat through five meetings with the Department of Health and Service Services working on revisions to the NJ Youth Camp Safety Act. Claudine was very helpful, advising us on how to approach issues and following up after the discussions. She enabled our collective voice be heard. As a previous experience in another state taught me, having a Governmental Affairs Consultant is like having an experienced trail guide. You can do the trip alone if you have to, but with a guide you are far better prepared to get to where you want to go in the safest and most direct manner.

This is a project for all camps in NJ. Support this project and your own camp by joining NJC-GAP. Everyone will benefit. Membership information has been mailed to all members. ## President's Message

Dear Members,

At this year's ACA National Conference in Austin, Texas, nine NJ members were in attendance. Let's make it 18 in '08, when the event moves to Nashville, Tennessee.

Sue Goldberg, Scott Lantzman, Peg Mellors and I attended as delegates, and we appreciated the opportunity to represent our section. We are pleased to report that the sessions were interactive and informative. Topics focused on the complaint resolution program, background checks, section elections and nomination procedures, 2007 standards update, board development issues and public policies such as the climbing walls issues and minimum wages.

Delegate input was collected and will be discussed in committees during the year. Check the ACA website throughout the season as more information becomes available. Also please read the delegate reports in this issue, and feel free to contact any of our delegates for further information. It is anticipated that the '08 delegates will be asked to vote on many of the topics discussed, so thinking ahead will be important, and your input will be very helpful.

Delegates also received a status report on the financial health of the National organization, as well as on Campaign '07 and plans for the upcoming 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of ACA and the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of organized CAMPING. Also, our section was recognized for its \$25,000 contribution to Campaign '07 over the past five years.

For those of you planning ahead (which is always a good idea), the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary ACA will be celebrated in Washington, D.C. in 2010. If you would like to serve on a task force to assist our section in preparation for this momentous event, please contact Mary Ellen.

In other news, a new software system to replace our current 30-year-old outdated system is near completion and will be rolled out in the Fall of '07. National ACA is paying 95 percent of the overall costs of the planning and implementation at a projected cost of \$585,000. The ongoing annual fees (approximately \$73,000) will be divided, with National paying 40 percent and Sections paying 60 percent. The Technology Task Force and ACA Section Executives are reviewing the various payment models and gathering input from their boards. The first billing to Sections for the new system is scheduled for January 2008.

Finally, please remember that as you gear up for the 2007 camp season, our section can help you market staff training sessions that you open to participants outside of your camp. Just inform Mary Ellen and she will post your training sessions on our Training Calendar at [www.acacampnj.org](http://www.acacampnj.org).

## ACA Standards Program As An Organization It's What We Do Best!

By now all the NJ camps due to be visited this summer should be well into the process of preparing. Those of you not due a visit until next year or the year after should also have begun looking at the new standards so that your efforts to address them can start without delay. No reason to wait until the last minute.

Preparing for accreditation is always a demanding task, and this year with the new standards and revisions it is even more so. But directors should not be thinking of it as "busy work," or just one more tedious thing to do. Rather, it should be viewed as one of the most important and high priority items on your calendar. It is an extraordinary educational event, regardless of your tenure in the industry. Standards visits—and the preparation for them—should be a wake up call, reminding us all about best industry practices. We must think ahead and stay ahead. Please use the summer visits as an opportunity to renew your commitment, dedication, knowledge base and determination to make your camp the best camp possible. That will reflect well on all of us.

Visitors, remember to share, network, learn, exchange great ideas, and to give a little help and encouragement where needed. As an organization it is what we do best. Let's raise the bar on the quality of camping one more notch, camp by camp, and let's begin the process today.

Here are some quick reminders of what should be happening in the month of May:

### Visitors

By now you should have contacted your camp and arranged a WDP (Written Document Preview).

By now you and your second visitor should be working to coordinate a date with the camp director for the actual visit. **DO NOT WAIT UNTIL JUNE.**

By now you should have received the packet of forms for the camp you are to visit. Open it, review it, and pay special attention to the new score forms. Call me if you have any questions or problems, or if anything is missing.

### Directors

By now you know who your visitors are. If they have not called you yet, call them. Don't wait. Get the process moving.

By now you should be done (or almost done) with your

review of the standards and your preparation of paperwork, documentation and any changes you want to institute to your program. June 25 is just around the corner.

It is important that you and the visitor completely agree on the modes under which your camp is to be scored and the specialized program activity list. Talk to your visitor and be sure the two of you are in agreement so that a disagreement does not arise in July, when too late to fix. If you have any program issues or activities that have gray areas in relation to these issues, raise the issues with the visitor and talk it out ahead of time.

If by the time you are reading this you have been unable to make a satisfactory connection with your visitor, please let Mary Ellen or me know right away.

Good Luck! Have a Great "WDP," and may it be the portal through which you can look ahead to a wonderfully productive Standard's Visit, and an even greater summer!

## Amusement Update

It has been three months since the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) issued an exemption for ACA-NJ camps from the state's amusement regulations as they apply to rock walls. Based on conversations with individual ACA-NJ camps and feedback during Tri-State, it appears that some camps are still having problems with DCA inspectors on this issue. Based on your feedback, we contacted Mike Triplett at DCA who, in turn, conferred with his supervisors to clear up any confusion.

Here is a brief recap of the exemption as it applies to ACA accredited camps and rock walls in New Jersey:

***DCA will not regulate a rock wall operating at your camp if it is the ONLY amusement present on the site.*** "Amusements," as far as DCA is concerned, include inflatables, go-carts and other mechanical rides. ***The ACA-NJ exemption letter kicks in once there is another "amusement" present.*** DCA has agreed to exempt rock walls at ACA accredited camps from regulation provided the following three requirements are met: 1) the camp is ACA accredited; 2) the rock wall is used as an educational or team building exercise (no unstructured/free climbing); and 3) the camp maintains records showing compliance with ACA Standards Section PC (Program/Adventure Challenge) with respect to the rock wall.

## Thanks for the Memories... Tri-State Chair Bids Farewell

Six hundred camps with well over 3000 attendees flooded into Atlantic City last month to participate in what many colleagues said was 'the best Tri-State ever.' Emotions were high as our 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary kicked off on Wednesday. All the Tri-State exhibitors present (many of them have been with us for more than 20 years) received a beautiful commemorative plaque. It was an exciting four days of stellar educational programs, coupled with the largest exhibit hall ever! From the breakfast sessions to the late-night EPIC events, Tri-State 2007 had so much to offer! A sincere "thank you" to the many attendees, vendors, professional staff and volunteers who made it all happen.

When I was asked to become the Tri-State Chair back in 2003, I was concerned that although the conferences were terrific, each year was looking very much like the year before, in content, preparation, layout, and other elements. I knew that if I took the honor of becoming the Tri-State chair, I would not pass up the opportunity to take some chances, break the mold a bit, and try to make the best even better. I had many ideas, which the Tri-State Steering Committee embraced and helped turn into reality.

The opportunity to change got a jump-start back in 2004 when we decided that the crowded session rooms and exhibit hall space at the New York Hilton weren't conducive for our purposes. To our surprise, the closest location that could house our unique conference was Atlantic City. It was a good choice. But would the crowds follow? That was the question. The answer turned out to be yes.

In the meantime, we took Hospitality and made even more hospitable (although we kept the ugly vests). EPIC then went from an idea to a reality, all in about 8 months. A year later it became a national model of how to get young professionals involved, and more importantly, it hosted our successful Tri-State Evening Activities. Which brings me to Laurie Rinke. I cannot thank her enough. She has been an integral member of the Program Committee, the first ever Tri-State Social Chair, and a great new friend.

Taking Jay Jacobs' advice to create more concrete networking and social opportunities, Tri-State now offers a Veterans Workshop Track, which had over 65 attendees, and, of course, EPIC, which had close to 90! The annual SCOPE Dinner featured the "Legends of Camping" inductees, which this year alone raised almost \$250,000. Since moving to Atlantic City, the SCOPE Dinner has grown in size, thanks to the drive of a great dinner committee, and lots of generous attendees!

We took another leap forward during the tenure of program chair Jonathan Gold. Jonathan's business school background helped the Program Committee create new, easy-to-understand program tracks, and added more professional speakers than ever before. Some of the most dynamic Tri-State volunteers are the ones that put together this stellar program each September and October, while many of us are taking a break. When I first volunteered for the Tri-State Program Committee about 12 years ago, I was a little overwhelmed at first, but a calming phone call from veteran Cricket Snering put me on the right track. Cricket continues to toil away in the trenches for the Tri-State Program year after year as a committee member and session leader extraordinaire!

In 2006 we created an online, year-round solution to all Camp purchasing needs with the Camp Shopping Network ([www.campshoppingnetwork.com](http://www.campshoppingnetwork.com)). Under the direction of our conference director, Scott Rothschild and with on-site supervision of Brian Cohen and Fred Guzman, the Tri-State exhibit Hall quickly expanded. We welcomed 70 new companies in 2006 and 80 in our Sold-Out 2007 Hall! Moving the exhibit hall from Wednesday to Friday proved to increase traffic flow, as well as make our exhibitors very happy.

The new combined program/exhibitor book, the online program planner, online hotel reservations, online program session submissions (we had over 200 last year) and, of course, the 1000-page handout booklet with searchable CD-ROM, all took hundreds of hours of planning and preparation. Scott Rothschild did the bulk of the dirty work. His tireless efforts, including keeping me on track, helped put the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Tri-State Conference over the top, and raised the bar for my worthy successor, Steve Baskin.

When Cricket was awarded her second Tri-State Award a few years back, she graciously thanked all of the people who have led all of the wonderful sessions, helped put together the exhibit hall, and volunteered for such an awesome annual experience. I echo her noble sentiments. Thank you all. I am anxiously looking forward to my return as a Tri-State attendee.

Orlando, Chicago, Austin. Sites of the past three National Conferences all of which I had the privilege of attending. As I looked around the room in Austin, I couldn't help but feel proud to be a member of the American Camp Association and call myself a professional in the camping industry.

Our National conference brought 1163 camping professionals together from all over the country, representing all 50 of the United States. When a diverse group of this size gets together, ideas are exchanged in a non-competitive forum where people truly only want to help the industry (and more importantly, you) grow. There is less of a frenzied attitude here (which can probably be attested to all those mid-westerners that attend National) and everything is approached from a more relaxing point of view than we in the Northeast are accustomed to.

But the best illustration of the difference between National and Tri State is that whereas Tri State is for my camp staff, National is for me. When I return from National each year I feel refreshed, reinvigorated and validated as a camp professional—to mix a metaphor, ready to take the world by its horns. When I return from Tri State I have tons of great ideas about what I can do to make my camp better and exciting for the campers, but I am also exhausted and stressed out about all of the stuff that still needs to get done before that first camper shows up on my doorstep.

I know how hard it must be to get away from the freezing February winds and to sacrifice all that shoveling when it inevitably snows in Jersey while National is going on. I understand that there is a lot to do in the camp office and that if you actually left for a few days in February the entire infrastructure would collapse. ## ACA National Council of Delegates Meeting

*Austin, TX, February 2007*

The February 2007 ACA National Conference was not my first national, but it was my first time serving as a delegate—and it was quite an informative and exciting experience.

This year's session did not involve motions for discussion and approval, but rather gave the delegates an opportunity to provide input to several of the National Board committees and task groups about the issues they have on their agendas for the coming years.

Board development, the Code of Ethics and Complaints Resolution, and an address from President Ann Sheets took up the first day.

In addition, a pilot program called ProtectScreen was reviewed. This allows participating camps to submit fingerprints of their volunteers to the FBI, which sends any resulting records to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC). NCMEC reviews the records and makes a determination of whether or not the individual meets the criteria to serve as a volunteer. Camps then can make their own decisions. The cost is \$18 per volunteer and the turnaround time is one week or less. For more information on ProtectScreen and other background check options, go to the public policy section of the ACA website.

The following day gave us the opportunity to give input to the Public Policy committee. Interestingly, it was held in the form of a debate. The debate question was: "Should ACA fingerprint ACA organizational volunteers as a condition of participation in leadership roles?" Each table discussed and then presented their arguments. Comments, as you might expect, ran the gamut from pro to con, and while no winner or loser was declared, many strong arguments on both sides of the issue were presented. We will hear much more in the coming months (and years) on this intriguing topic.

To me, the most exciting part of this year's Council of Delegates session was having the opportunity to provide some thoughts to the committee that is planning the 100th Anniversary Celebration of ACA in 2010. That is truly

The purpose of this five-year study is to monitor illness and injury among campers and staff at U.S. summer camps, so that preventive strategies can be identified and integrated into camps.

ANY day or resident camp program may participate in the study regardless of organizational affiliation (both ACA and non-ACA camps). All camps in the study will receive an annual confidential summary of their own camp data as well as a copy of the national data report for their type of camp (day or resident).

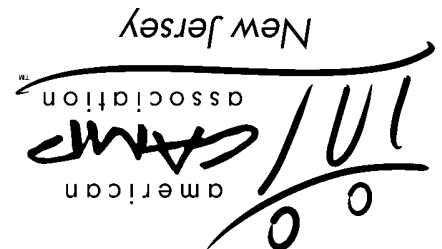
Participation in this study involves about 20 minutes of a summer staff person's time per week to complete an online survey about camp illnesses and injuries.
